# Ratios of Disproportionality by County

These maps show county-specific "ratios of disproportionality" as defined in the paper for which this document provides supplemental maps, expressed as a percentage. For each county, this ratio is calculated as the percentage of Black (or Hispanic) residents of a county who live below one meter, divided by the percentage of all residents in the county who live below one meter (times 100). The legend uses the term "Relative Habitation" to conserve space. When the ratio is 100, there is no disproportionality. If the ratio is greater (or less) than 100, then the Black (or Hispanic) population is more (or less) exposed to sea level rise than the general population of the county (ignoring different likelihoods of shore protection).
